planning, participating in baking cakes and activities, and donating. Thank you to the Creative i-media team for taking photos of the day.






#### NATIONAL TABLE TENNIS COMPETITION

Following an extensive warm up, the team took to the start line next to the other 156 athletes from the 26 schools who also gualified for the National Final. All 6 boys finished the race and overall, the team placed 8th nationally which is an outstanding achievement considering well over a thousand schools enter this competition. The team

## GEOGRAPHY STRATFORD TRIP

their human geography coursework.

positive and quickly got to grips with their chosen sites. Several field sketches, environmental surveys, and photographs later we unleashed the pupils onto the unsuspecting public who, through interviews, were able to give a personal response to the impact of the regeneration of the area.



Our pupils were comparing the impact of regeneration on three separate sites – the Olympic park, Carpenter's lock; which is close to the infamous fridge mountain, and finally White Post Lane in Hackney Wick.



There is a great deal of walking on the day which was wonderful for a target of 10,000 steps a day but it also enabled staff to show

the pupils how the regeneration has had an impact socially, economically and environmentally for the locals.

Our final destination was Westfield which provided a lovely warm and dry venue for lunch and a chance to collect our thoughts.
