

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

As the Spring Term draws to a close, I am able to reflect on the many and varied activities and successes of the past three months.

The inaugural 'Cultural Day' was a significant high point, bringing all members of the school community together in a genuinely cohesive social and cultural experience. I would like to extend my personal gratitude to the Diversity Committee who were the driving force behind this event.



Of all the individual achievements over the term, I would like to take this opportunity to personally congratulate Hope E. (10E) for receiving Blue Peter's highest award, the Gold Badge. This is an exceptionally rare award and one, quite rightly, that should be celebrated together.

There have been innumerable charity events and I would like to thank parents and pupils for their generosity in supporting the many worthy causes. One such cause is the Carli Lansley Foundation. which aims to provide a free electrocardiogram (ECG) screening to young people (aged 14-35) to help detect any previously undiagnosed heart conditions. In terms of school-wide achievements, I am particularly pleased that attendance has steadily increased and currently stands at 2.5% above the national average. For many reasons, this continues to be a challenge nationally a remains a key priority for the Academy.

In terms of the development of the curriculum, further to my letter dated 7th March, I can confirm that the Academy will be following a three-year Key Stage 3 (Year 7-9) and a two-year Key Stage 4 (Year 10-11) curriculum model from September 2023. The model is broad, balanced and ambitious and will further enhance progress at both Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4.

Attendance is 93.4 % vs. a national average of 90.9% (\pm 2.5%) and persistent absence is 16.0% vs. a national average of 27.0% (\pm 11.0%).

Heidi - 60m Sprint



HISTORY BELGIUM TRIP

We picked up Frank, our usual guide, en route, and, for the first time, headed to the port to catch the ferry. After various passport checks, scans and stamps we boarded, and pupils had time to peruse the duty free, eat breakfast,

lose a phone, lose a bag of drinks, and then locate both before departing. As always, Frank was incredible. His knowledge of all things WWI knows no bounds and his delivery is so engaging.



Our first stop was the Bayernwald

couldn't....go home".
